September 13 th	The Revd R Blight Diocesan Inspector examined the children and expressed himself very pleased. Attendance low gleaning not being over. Revd Dr Pemberton, Mrs Pemberton and Miss Griffiths visited.
September 16 th	The Revd Dr Pemberton visited and took the second class in a reading lesson.
September 18 th	Mrs Pemberton visited this day.
September 23 rd	Lady Burrell visited the school
September 26 th	Lady Burrell, Mrs W Burrell and Miss Griffiths visited. Inspected the needlework and heard the children sing.
September 27 th	Miss Griffiths visited the school. Dr Pemberton gave a scripture lesson to first class at 9.15.
October 1 st 1872	A fair in the neighbourhood, attendance low. School routine as usual
October 8 th	School conducted by Miss Griffiths and Mrs Pemberton the Mistress being absent on leave.
October 14 th	Revd Dr Pemberton visited 9.15 and took first class in Scripture.

October 16 th	Miss Griffiths visited and gave a singing lesson. Mrs Pemberton visited the school
October 23 rd	On making enquiries was informed that Mary Balchin had left on account of boys upsetting her on the road. Copy of Inspector's report:
	Mrs Jessup was appointed in January last (the school having been closed during the previous 6 months) and can therefore hardly be held responsible for the present state of things. The standard of attainment is very low. None were presented above Standard II. The Mistress has evidently taken much pains with the reading, which is the best subject; the arithmetic is very poor. The children are very well ordered under Mrs Jessup's management. An improvement will, I believe, be effected. [signed] E Griffiths, Treasurer

November 1 st 1872	Attendance for the past week very low owing to bad weather.
November 4 th	On enquiry was informed that Emily Linfield had left for service.
November 8 th	School routine as usual.
November 12 th	Revd Dr Pemberton visited the school.
November 15 th	School as usual.
November 21 st	Two or three cases of sickness reported. Many of the younger children absent through bad weather.
November 27 th	Weather still very unfavourable.
December 3 rd 1872	Weather still very rough attendances this day only eleven.
December 9 th	The school conducted by Mrs Pemberton and Miss Griffiths this week – the Mistress being at Brighton.
December 19 th	School closed for Xmas holiday.

January 6th 1873	School reopened. Half holiday. The Revd Dr Pemberton visited.
January 10 th	School routine as usual.
January 17 th	Several of the children left for the winter months.
January 24 th	Dr Pemberton and Miss Griffiths visited during the week.
January 31 st	Word sent that Caroline Laker had left for service.
February 7 th 1873	School routine during the past week as usual.
February 12 th	Dr Pemberton visited during the week and took second class in reading.
February 13 th	Mrs Pemberton visited also Mr & Mrs Burrell.
February 14 th	Some time spent in ascertaining who had taken a child's dinner.
February 17 th	Miss Griffiths and Mrs Pemberton visited and heard the children sing.
February 20 th	Mrs Pemberton visited and gave a garment each to eight children who had attended most regularly.
February 24 th	A heavy fall of snow – not one of fourth class attended.
February 27 th	Mrs Pemberton visited the school.
February 28 th	Attendance for last week very low. The roads were flooded and the children not able to pass.
March 4 th 1873	Mrs Pemberton visited twice during the week. Miss Griffiths also visited. School routine as usual.
March 11 th	Miss Griffiths visited and brought the new reading books.
March 13 th	Mrs Burrell and Miss Griffiths visited the school.
March 21 st	Miss Griffiths and Mrs Pemberton visited during the week. Several cases of sickness reported.
March 28 th	Twelve children have left for a fortnight to work in the fields.
April 2 nd 1873	The Revd Glover and Miss Griffiths visited and heard the children sing.
April 5 th	Mrs Pemberton and Dr Gooddie visited and expressed themselves pleased with the order cleanliness of the children.

April 9 th	Mrs Pemberton and Mrs Burrell visited the school.
April 10 th	School closed for Easter holiday. Miss Griffiths visited the school.
April 20 th	School reopened. Attendance good.
April 23 rd	[Log book signed by R.L. Koe – H.M.I.]
April 28 th	Word sent that Charlotte Evans who was admitted last week would be required at home 'till after harvest to keep house – her mother being employed in the fields. This child is over nine years of age could neither read nor write and had to be put with the infants. [Signed] C Jessup
May 1 st 1873	On this day the children are accustomed to carry out garlands consequently the attendance was very low.
May 2 nd	Mrs Pemberton visited the school.
May 5 th	Six children absent through illness and one for want of shoes.
May 9 th	School routine as usual.
May 13 th	Coolham Club. <u>Seven</u> children <u>only</u> presented themselves this morning – the school was closed for the day.
May 19 th	Four children left till <u>after harvest</u> their mothers being employed in the fields.
May 21 st	A week's leave granted to Ann Hart, Mary Linfield and Emily Wells, to attend on their mothers who are sick and unable to do for themselves.
May 26 th	Ann Hart returned after a week's leave. Four more children required at home while their mothers are employed in the fields.
May 28 th	Word sent that Charlotte Evans (admitted only the week before) would not return till after harvest her mother having to work in the fields. This child was over nine years of age and could neither read nor write.
June 2 nd 1873	Whitemonday (sic) a holiday given.
June 3 rd	On this day the school was conducted by Mrs Pemberton – the Mistress being unable to attend to her duties.
June 4 th & 5 th	School conducted by Mrs Pemberton and Miss Griffiths – the Mistress being unable to attend through indisposition. School routine as usual.
June 9 th	Mrs Wells called stating her daughter would not return for some weeks on account of her health.
June 12 th	Revd Dr Pemberton visited and took the second class in a reading lesson. Jane Adams aged eleven years a good useful girl in school left for service.
June 16 th	Attendance good.
June 18 th	A <u>very very</u> wet day attendance very low.
June 19 th	Revd Dr Pemberton visited 10.30 and spoke to MJ Penfold who played truant on 17 th inst.
June 23 rd	The Mistress being absent on leave the school was conducted by Mrs Pemberton. Emily Milham returned. Sarah Linfield returned after several weeks absence to assist attending on her father who was very ill.
June 25 th	Revd Dr Pemberton visited the school.
July 2 nd 1873	Louisa Baker not able to come to school for a few weeks not having any shoes. Sarah Short required at home for fortnight.
July 8 th	Mrs Pemberton visited the school.
July 11 th	Emily Botting required at home to attend on her father.
July 14 th	Sarah Short returned after a fortnight absence.
July 16 th	Maud and Amy Wright left their parents having removed.
July 21 st	Sarah Short left school being required at home.
July 25 th	School closed for six weeks – Harvest holiday.
September 8 th 1873	School reopened after six weeks holiday. Attendance 14. Several of the parents called saying their children would not be able to come to school for two or three weeks harvest not being over through wet weather.

September 16 th	Attendance this week rather higher but still low, many of the children being in the fields gleaning. Miss Griffiths visited the school.
September 22 nd	Several of the children returned this week, attendance very fair.
September 26 th	Miss Griffiths visited during the week. School routine as usual.
October 2 nd 1873	Two parents reported their children could not attend school for want of clothes. Mary Goacher aged nine years returned from service and was readmitted after several months absence. Ann Goacher readmitted this week her mother promising to send her regularly.
October 6 th	The Mistress being absent on leave the school was conducted by Miss Griffiths.
October 8 th	A very wet day attendance low.
October 10 th	Ditto
October 13 th	A very wet morning.
October 14 th	Miss Griffiths visited and questioned the children.
October 15 th	Miss Griffiths visited, heard the children sing.
October 16 th	The school was examined by the Diocesan Inspector and half holiday given. Present – Lady Burrell, Miss Griffiths, Mrs C Burrell and Miss Hubbard. The Revd H Gorham and Revd W Hunt.
October 20 th	Miss Griffiths visited and practised the children in singing.
October 24 th	The Mistress was absent through a death in the family. Many of the children absent picking acorns.
October 29 th	Miss Griffiths visited and gave a singing lesson.
October 31 st	A very very wet day only seven children came. No schooling in consequence.
November 3 rd 1873	Mary Ann and Emma Goacher taken off the register the mother having stated they had no clothes or shoes and she could not send them during the winter.
November 10 th	Mary and Ann Goacher (Broomers Corner) taken off the register as they had only attended 3 or 4 days since their readmission a month ago and their mother on being spoken to respecting their irregular attendance sent word she should keep her children at home when she pleased.
	Copy of HM Inspectors Report 1873 The older girls passed very fairly in Standard III, but the younger ones are not proportionately advanced, owing, in some measure, to their very irregular attendance. Desks very poor, Needlework good. New desks should at once be provided. Mrs Jessup will shortly receive her Certificate. (Article 59, New Code) [Signed] Eliza Griffiths, Treasurer
November 14 th	Nothing of importance occurred. School routine as usual.
November 20 th	Attendance good. School routine as usual.
November 25 th	Miss Griffiths visited and practised the children in singing.
November 28 th	School routine as usual.
December 2 nd 1873	Miss Griffiths visited the school.
December 4 th	The Revd H Gorham visited and questioned the children on the Church Catechism.
December 8 th	Miss Griffiths visited the school.
December 9 th	Ann Goacher presented herself this morning. The Mistress refused to readmit her till Lady Burrell had been informed of their very irregular attendance and of the rude message sent by the mother when requested to send them more regularly.
December 11 th	Miss Griffiths visited the school and gave a singing lesson.
December 12 th	School routine during the past week as usual.
December 15 th	Miss Griffiths visited the school and inspected the needlework. Attendance this day very fair.
December 18 th	Miss Griffiths visited, addressed the children and closed the school for the Christmas holidays.

December 24 th	The management of the school is handed over to the Revd H Gorham [signed] Henrietta Burrell, Eliza Griffiths Treasurer
1874	
Feb 16th 1874	Commenced duty as Mistress this day. The school is reopened after having been closed since Christmas. Sixteen children present. [signed] Ellen Roney. [She adds later on 17 th April] – In the following note dated Feb 16 th The Mistress has omitted to state that she has had 13 yrs experience as a teacher. 12 in Poor Law schools and 1 in National Elementary and that she sat for certificate in December 1873.
February 18 th	Ash Wednesday. Children attended church in the morning. Attendance 21
February 26 th	Very wet. Only 7 in attendance.
March 6 th 1874	Average Attendance this week 31. I find the children orderly and attentive. Reading of elder children good. Arithmetic weak throughout the school. Miss Griffiths and the Rev H.S. Gorham visited this afternoon and heard the children sing.
March 13 th	Examined the several standards. With a few exceptions among the younger children all do fairly in Reading. Not so many passes made in Writing and in Arithmetic there is yet much to be done.
March 20 th	Average attendance for the week 33. School routine as usual.
March 23 rd	The Rev Glover visited the school.
March 30 th	Attendance this day 41. The Rev H.S. Gorham visited the school.
April 2 nd 1874	School closed for Easter holidays.
April 13 th	School reopened after holidays. Attend. very good, considering the state of the weather. Mr & Mrs Gorham visited.
April 14 th	Miss Griffiths called in the forenoon and Mrs Gorham in the afternoon to inspect needlework.
April 16 th	[Log signed by W.H Crocker H.M.I.]
April 16 th	The Mistress has received a notification from the Ed. Department that her examination on 9 th Dec 1873 was passed successfully and that she has gained a place in the Third Division of the class list.
April 20 th	The Rev H.S. Gorham visited and gave the Scripture lesson to the 1st division.
April 24 th	The Rev H.S Gorham gave Scripture lesson to the lowed division of the school.
April 29 th	The Rev H.S Gorham gave Scripture lesson to the 1 st division. Attendance lower this week.
May 1 st 1874	18 children present in the morning. A holiday given in the afternoon.
May 4 th	The Rev H.S Gorham visited and catechised 1 st division. New Reading Books for 1 st and 2 nd standards have been provided. There are now two sets for each class. The children are making a little visible progress in arithmetic.
May 8 th	School routine as usual.
May 12 th	Coolham Club. Two children only put in an appearance. School closed for the day.
May 13 th	[Written and signed by Rev Gorham] The Inspectors Report dated May 12 th states the following to be the results of the examination held on the 16 th April 1874. Average Attendance for Past Year 38 Number presented for Examination 14 Number Passed – Reading 11, Writing 10, Arithmetic 7. Copy of Report: “The premises are to be refitted. Miss E Roney was appointed in February and under her management the School will I hope improve. Arithmetic very weak. Order good”. No grant is payable as the School has not met 400 times in the course of the year. (Article 19) Signed, Henry S Gorham Secretary
May 14 th	Ascension Day. Children attended church in the morning. A half holiday in afternoon.
May 15 th	The Rev H.S Gorham visited and gave the Scripture lesson.

June 18 th	Weather fine. Attendance 38.

June 29 th	The Rev H.S Gorham visited, occupying the time set aside for religious instruction by short service, it being St Peter's Day.

June 10 th	Attendance low owing to weather. The younger children are improving in Arithmetic and Reading. Geography lesson instead of Music.
June 13 th	Attendance low. A village gala day. 19 present in afternoon.
June 17 th	Mistress absent on leave. School conducted by Miss Thorns.
June 24 th	School work as usual. A few children have left for the harvest.
June 27 th	A very wet morning. Only 5 children present.
June 28 th	School closed for Harvest Holidays.
June 29 th	Termination of Teacher's engagement [signed] E Roney Mistress.
September 7 th 1874	Commenced as temporary Mistress this day. [signed] Caroline Thorns
September 11 th	A very wet day, only five children present. Attendance low all week.
September 14 th	The Rev H.S Gorham visited and catechised upper division in the morning. 24 children present.
September 18 th	School routine as usual. Average attendance this week 28.
September 22 nd	Only twenty children present in the afternoon it being Coolham Fair day.
September 25 th	Weather fine. School routine as usual.
October 1 st 1874	The Rev H.S Gorham and friend visited in the morning.
October 2 nd	A very wet day, eight children present, not one of fourth class attended.
October 5 th	Mrs & Miss Morton visited in afternoon. School hours changed from two till half past four to half past one to four during the winter months.
October 7 th	A very wet morning only three children present.
October 16 th	School routine for the past week as usual.
October 23 rd	Average attendance for this week 30.
October 26 th	Rev Gorham visited and catechised upper division.
October 28 th	Ann Hart a very useful girl in school left for service.
November 2 nd 1874	Fanny Linfield readmitted she promising to come regularly.
November 6 th	Average attendance this week 32. Weather fine.
November 9 th	Rev Gorham visited and catechised lower division.
November 16 th	Sarah Heasman returned after a month's absence through measles. School hours changed from half past one till four to one till half past three as the parents complain their children are dark home. [sic]
November 20 th	School routine as usual.
November 24 th	The Rev H.S Gorham visited and gave a geography lesson.
December 1 st 1874	Charlotte Nicholson returned after six weeks absence having had no shoes to wear.

December 4 th	Average attendance 23.
December 11 th	School routine as usual.
December 16 th	A very snowy day. Only seven present.
December 18 th	School closed for Christmas holidays.
1875	
January 11th 1875	School reopened, 33 girls present. Miss Emma Hobbs commenced her duties as Mistress. The School Fees are raised to twopence for the lowest fee – a reduction being made where more than one child in a family attend together. Rev H.S. Gorham catechised the school grouped. [sic] [Initialled H.S.G.] Commenced duties as Mistress. I have had five years' experience as a teacher in a National Elementary School, resided for two years in Brighton Training College & sat for Certificate in December 1874. [signed] Emma M Hobbs.
January 15 th	The Rev. H.S. Gorham visited, and gave Scripture Lesson to lower division. Arithmetic is very weak throughout the school, and the writing of all the classes is poor.
January 19 th	Mrs Gorham called in the afternoon to inspect the needlework.
January 21 st	The Rev. H.S. Gorham and Mrs Burrell visited the school in the afternoon.
January 22 nd	The Rev. H.S. Gorham visited, and gave Scripture Lesson to upper division.
January 25 th	The Rev. H.S. Gorham visited, and occupied the time set apart for Religious Instruction by a short service, it being St Paul's day.
February 2 nd 1875	The Rev. H.S. Gorham visited and gave a Scripture Lesson to upper division.
February 5 th	Average attendance for week 33.
February 10 th	Ash Wednesday. The children attended church in the morning.
February 16 th	Mrs Gorham visited the school in the afternoon.
February 19 th	An improvement has been visible this week in Arithmetic, but the spelling of all the classes needs great attention.
February 24 th	A holiday given in the afternoon owing to the bad weather.
February 26 th	Weather still very bad. None of the children present. School closed for the day.
March 2 nd 1875	A very wet day. Only one child present.
March 5 th	Average attendance this week only 21 owing to bad weather.
March 9 th	Only one child attended owing to bad weather.
March 15 th	The Rev. H.S. Gorham visited the school in the morning and catechised the upper division.
March 25 th	School closed for Easter holidays.
March 30 th	School reopened. Attendance 24. The Mistress has received a notice from the Training College Brighton, stating that her examination on December 7 th 1874 was passed successfully, and that she has been placed in the Second Division of the Class List.
April 1 st 1875	Mrs Gorham visited the school in the afternoon and heard the children sing.
April 8 th	The Rev. H.S. Gorham visited the school in the morning.
April 9 th	Only 18 children present, owing to bad weather.
April 16 th	Emily Longhurst returned to school this week, after being absent more than two months through illness.
April 22 nd	Only 14 children present owing to bad weather.
April 27 th	Mrs Money visited the school in the morning and heard the children sing.
May 6 th	Ascension Day. The children attended church in the morning. A holiday given in the afternoon.
May 11 th	Coolham Club. A holiday given.
17 th	Whit Monday. Holiday.
May 28 th	Attendance good considering the weather. Average for the week 32.
June 4 th 1875	Ellen Botting left school being required at home. Three cases of sickness reported this week. The Revd. Money visited the school in the morning.
June 11 th	Several children absent through sickness this week.

June 18 th	Several children have left this week for the summer months being required at home while their mothers are at work in the fields.
June 27 th	The Revd Money and Mrs Money visited the school in the afternoon.
July 1 st 1875	A very wet day. Only 19 children present.
July 6 th	The Revd. H.S. Gorham visited the school in the morning. Copy of Inspectors Report made subsequent to his visit April 2 nd : "The school was without a certificated teacher from July to Christmas when Miss Hobbs Joined. Order good. Instruction pretty fair. Needlework good. No alteration has been made in the fittings as things are in abeyance till the new Scheme is settled". No Grant is made for the five months of the late school year during which the school was without a certificated teacher. (Article 17 (d).) The ninth supplementary Rule should be strictly observed in future. Signed Henry S. Gorham Manager and Secretary

January 3rd 1876	School reopened after holidays. 25 girls present.
January 7 th	School inspection
January 10 th	The Rev. H.S. Gorham visited the school in the afternoon.
January 24 th	Mrs Gorham visited the school in the morning.
January 29 th	Copy of summary of the Inspectors report on the school made subsequent to the inspection made on January 7 th : "As only nine months have elapsed since the last inspection the school seems to be making good progress in respect of instruction though the Arithmetic of the third standard is only moderate, and the reading of the elder girls should be more intelligent. The discipline is good. Suitable furniture and apparatus are to be supplied when the school building is finished" signed, Henry S. Gorman. Secretary. [written in the hand of Rev Gorman]
February 3 rd	The Rev. H.S. Gorham visited and gave the Scripture lesson.

March 30 th	Mrs Burrell visited the school. Charity Newman and her sisters withdrawn from the school , the mother objecting to their punishment for untidy appearance, after the children had been cautioned respecting it.

April 24 th	Mrs Burrell visited the school in the morning.

May 19 th	Average attendance for week 36.
